Through educational programs, such as the Smart Talks podcast and prevention programs such as Smart Defense, the Elizabeth Smart Foundation promotes prevention, recovery, and advocacy.

The US Hunger Project is committed to providing healthy meals to those in need. They are committed to solving the root causes of food insecurity. Creating a hunger-free world will be possible if we work collectively to question the underlying poverty-driven socioeconomic factors that forced people to seek help from organizations in the first place. This knowledge has led them to understand that we have an obligation to not just feed people, but to address those factors in concert with one another.





OPERATION UNDERGROUND RAILROAD

Our work with O.U.R. in the fight against human trafficking continued across the world in 2021.

We funded the training of another police dog named Tor who was placed in the Derry Township Police Department in Hershey, Pennsylvania. Tor helps with search warrants and finding electronic devices containing crucial evidence that leads to the prosecution of sex trafficking perpetrators.

We funded a mobile forensic lab equipped with software and hardware to break into and extract data from electronic devices found on search warrants. Police must extract data by the time the warrant expires or they cannot

use the data as evidence. This lab has been donated to Pocatello, Idaho Police Department and ensures that recovered devices don't have to sit in a queue to become valid evidence.

We also aided in funding a rescue mission of 30 trafficked women in the Middle East. These women had been wrongfully imprisoned after they arrived in the Middle East expecting to be domestic helpers to the wealthy. Once they arrived, they had their cell phones and passports taken away and were enslaved and sometimes trafficked. Women who didn't obey or became pregnant were turned into the police for illegal immigration. This rescue mission paid their fines, returned them home, and provided aftercare therapy.

ELIZABETH SMART FOUNDATION


The Advancing Life™ Foundation sponsored any female ASEA employee who wanted to participate in the Smart Defense Course offered by the Elizabeth Smart Foundation; 30 women completed the training.

Smart Defense is a self-defense training course designed specifically for women and girls ages 10 and up.



By working closely with highly trained mixed martial arts experts and law enforcement professionals, the foundation customized the Smart Defense curriculum with the objective of giving women and girls the best advantage to either stop a potential threat or escape an attacker.





INTA KARA ADVANCING LIFE VOCATIONAL CENTER

After years of work and sacrifice, the Inta Kara Advancing Life vocational center in Ecuador has expanded its campus curriculum to include seven certification courses for 300 students per year. Through these courses, the school has advanced 200+ graduates from Inta-Kara.



Construction for the second building is complete and culinary courses are being taught. The top of the building now has a dorm room where students or teachers can stay overnight if needed. And a third building is being built which will serve as storage and additional sleeping rooms.

DIG DEEP

The foundation funded a wet lab in Kirtland, New Mexico at the Navajo Technical University. The University is now able to add plumbing to their list of available courses. Access to clean water is a problem in the Navajo Nation, and it is our hope that new skills will help solve water issues on their lands. The courses will begin in the fall of 2022.







VISION CAMBODIA

The foundation donated funds for 62 wells last year, bringing the total of Cambodian wells funded to over 200 wells in the past two years. These wells have been donated by individuals, families, and ASEA teams. Each well provides clean water for up to 100 people, depending on location.

O.U.R.

A well is being dug at an aftercare shelter in Kenya allowing rescued survivors to have a source of clean drinking water. This prevents them from having to walk miles every day to fetch water for cooking and drinking. They will be able to focus on therapy and aftercare, while creating revenue through selling bottles of water.

WHOLIVES

We also funded a village drill for locals in Malawi, Africa. The drill was purchased from WHOlives foundation and donated to the Footsteps Africa foundation in Malawi. It has the ability to drill up to 270 feet, while still breaking down and fitting into the back of a small truck or canoe. This enables locals to provide clean water in remote areas where a large drill rig would otherwise be unable to reach. The Village Drill is a human powered drill designed for boreholes which create access to safe drinking water.



Over the last year, the Advancing LifeTM Foundation has donated approximately 1,240,000 meals by working with the following partners:

- · Donated 600,000 meals to Feeding America
- · Donated 600,000 meals to Global Foodbanking Network
- ASEA volunteers assembled 40.000 meal kits at the ASEATM North America Conference. The kits contained everything for a nutritious jambalaya meal and were donated to the three most food-insecure counties in the United States.
- · 10,000 meal kits donated to Hancock County, Tennessee
- · 10,000 meals kits donated to Holmes County, Mississippi
- 10,000 meal kits donated to Presidio County, Texas
- · 10,000 meal kits donated to Oglala Lakota County, South Dakota

At ASEA and the Advancing Life™Foundation, we better people's lives by being a force for good in the world. Through various initiatives hosted by our corporate sponsor ASEA, employees are given the chance to donate their time and labor to raise awareness, funds, and provide supplies for important local service projects. In 2021, ASEA corporate employees helped with the following projects:

- · A seven-day fitness workout and hike to raise awareness of native women trafficking, in partnership with the Flizabeth Smart Foundation
- · Two blood drives to donate life-saving blood to the local communities in Utah, USA
- · Assembled 210 backpacks filled with supplies for refugee children in Utah. Approximately 60,000 refugees live in Utah and many can't afford the necessary school supplies needed for their educational success. ASEA corporate employees donated backpacks and school supplies.
- · 1,000 ASEA reusable water bottles were donated to Stansbury Elementary School so that children can have access to safe drinking water during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- · Donated a birthing table to a rural clinic in Cambodia so mothers can give birth to babies in a comfortable, clean, hygienic, and safe environment.
- · ASEA employees assembled 500 toy cars for Tiny Tim's Toys, which gives toys to children in third-world countries who otherwise would grow up without a toy to play with.





The Foundation announced that every year during the week of 11 September, we will host ASEA Impact Week in honor of ASEA Founder Verdis Norton's birthday. We held our first Impact Week in conjunction with our ASEA™ North America Conference in Nashville. We collaborated with the US Hunger Project and assembled food kits that were donated to four food banks in the most food insecure areas of North America. Meanwhile, employees back at the corporate office worked on making wooden toy cars for children in third-world countries.
